Study Opportunities in Greece - 1971

As a regular feature of the Modern Greek Studies Association BULLETIN a list of institutions offering courses in Greece is given below. This list is incomplete since many institutions have not responded to the request for information sent out to them. The editor would appreciate very much hearing from members who know of other institutions so that they may be included in the June BULLETIN. Please write to Dr. Julia W. 1. Aegean Institute (June 15-July 31). An incorporated non-profit organization located on the island of Poros, 2½ hours by boat from Athens, designed for college students or graduates interested in the country and the culture. Courses include ancient Greek Art, Drama, History and Literature; Modern Greek language; Modern Greek Literature in Translation; Underwater Archaeology. Cost of \$475.00 includes room, board, tuition, and six excursions. Transportation to Greece not included. 2. Archaeological Practicum (Six weeks July-August). Sponsored by Brock University, Ontario, Canada, the practicum offers a systematic course in archaeological techniques in Salamis, Cyprus, in collaboration with the Department of Antiquities of Cyprus, open to undergraduates of junior standing, graduate students and teachers of Classics. Included are 6 hours of on-site excavating, lectures on the history of Cyprus and the development of archaeological techniques, daily lessons in Modern Greek, and weekly excursions. Cost of \$500.00 includes tuition, board and lodging in Famagusta, and field trips. Transportation to Greece not included but can be arranged. 3. City University of New York, Study in Salonika (July-August). This program is offered in conjunction with the several programs of the City University of New York for summer study abroad. Open to all students, whether of the City University or not, for credit. Participants are housed in a dormitory of the University of Thessaloniki. The fee of \$925.00 includes all travel and

accommodation expenses. Students who are not part of the CUNY system pay \$100.00 additional tuition fee. Courses offered are: Archaeology in Northern Greece, including many field trips; Byzantine History and Civilization (3 credits each); and Modern Greek language, which fulfils one semester of the language requirement provided a second semester is taken at an accredited University. 4. College Year in Athens, Inc. A regular academic year of study of Greek Civilization at the college level. Courses are offered in Greek History, Literature, Art and Archaeology, Anthropology, Modern and Classical Greek. Classes are highlighted by field trips to Crete, Olympia, and Delphi. 5. Hellenic Institute (June 14-August 14). Sponsored by the University of Colorado for the sixth summer, the program includes lectures in Classical Greek Art, Archaeology, History; post-classical and contemporary Greek Art, Literature, and History, as well as 24 days of field trips. A non-credit course in Modern Greek is optional. Cost of \$850.00 includes tuition, room and board in Athens, and transportation costs in Greece. For further information write to: Prof. David F. 6. The Knubly School of Greek Civilization (July 1-July 31, August 1-August 31)—two sessions each offering credit courses in Modern Greek, History of Greek Art, Minoan-Mycenaean Greece, Classical and Hellenistic Greece, History of the Byzantine Empire, Modern Greek Literature: Kazantzakis. The program is intended for college students who have successfully completed two years of undergraduate instruction at an American institution. Each course is equivalent to one academic credit. Cost of \$245.00 per person covers all courses, room and half-board, weekend archeological field trips. An additional examination fee of \$2.00 is required for all courses taken for credit. The school also offers a full-

year program of two semesters: October 4-January 28, and February 7-June 3. For further information write to: The Knubly School of Greek Civilization in Athens, Mas-salias 22, Athens 144, Greece.

7. Study in Greece in affiliation with Pierce College. A 5½ month program devoted to field and classroom study of Modern Greece, using the ultra-modern facilities of Pierce College, designed to give undergraduate students a cross-cultural experience and the opportunity to explore Greece, its people, culture, and language. The broad curriculum includes: Sociology, Economics, Anthropology, Art, Literature, Music, History, Psychology, and Education. The program consists of a regular classroom semester of 3½ months, while the remaining 2 months are set aside for trips to four major islands, living with Greek families, and undertaking independent study projects. There will be two sessions: June 28-December 18, 1971; January 17-July 8, 1972. Application deadline for first

session, May 15, 1971; for second, December 15, 1971. For brochure and information applicant should see his campus advisor on programs of study abroad, or write to the director, Mrs. Katherine Kipreos, Study in Greece, Pierce College, Box 472, Athens, Greece.

8. Summer Study In Greece (June 22-August 4). A six week summer study program designed for college students, graduate students, and teachers interested in learning more about Greek culture. Included are two three-credit courses, Greek Archaeology and Ancient and Modern Greek Culture; two non-credit courses, Modern Greek and Greek Folk Dance; and many field trips. Cost of \$1,400.00 includes tuition, room, board, all entrance fees at museums, round trip air fare from New York, and all transportation costs in Greece.
